

BUILDING PROJECTS UPDATE

We are pleased to share that good progress is being made on the redevelopment of the Middle School precinct project. Design development has been completed and the project is now out to tender, meaning a preferred builder will be appointed in the next couple of months. All going well, building works should commence later this year and continue into the middle part of 2019. As the images show, this \$3.5Million project will be a world class facility for our students and is the next phase of transforming our school to the highest quality learning environment possible. During 2019 design work will commence on the \$8Million Building Better Schools project that will renew the main school building and create innovative learning environments for students across the senior years of schooling. These projects will modernize Christies Beach High School and give our students the very best place to learn with access to the most up to date facilities and resources possible.

THEATRE EXCURSION TO 'THE CURIOUS INCIDENT OF THE DOG IN THE NIGHT-TIME'

22 students from senior Creative Arts (Performing Arts) classes, and some Year 10 English students attended the Adelaide Entertainment Centre in early August to experience the internationally acclaimed play, '*The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time*'.

Based on the bestselling novel by Mark Haddon, Simon Stephen's stage adaption has won many awards and comes directly from the famous West End in London.

The story creatively presents the mysterious death of the dog, Wellington, through the eyes of main character-Christopher Boone, who sets out to investigate the crime. He is, at times, aided and at other times hampered by the form of autism he lives with.

AUSTRALIAN STRING QUARTET PERFORMANCE

It's a valuable opportunity to travel to the city as a group and attend a professional performance by the prestigious Australian String Quartet (ASQ) at the Adelaide Town Hall.

On Thursday 5 July, Music students from Year 9 to Year 12 attended the performance with teachers Henry South, Ann Tannebring and Annette Greenshields. The dramatic programme included the first and last compositions written by Beethoven for string quartet: Opus 18 no 3 in D Major, and Opus 135 in F Major. Between these 2 works was the rhythmically energetic performance of the String Quartet no 3 Hunt Quartet by Jörg Widmann, a contemporary German composer and clarinet player. Our students thoroughly enjoyed the performance, using descriptions such as "amazingly magical" and "feeling the music connecting with our souls". It was great for students to experience a live performance in an authentic, professional context.

CONSERVATION AND LAND MANAGEMENT NEWS

The Environmental Learning Centre at Christies Beach High School has been a hub of activity in 2018. With the Wednesday Conservation and Land Management VET (Vocational Education and Training) course being at capacity. This includes training at Certificate 1 (20 Stage 1 SACE Credits), 2 (60 Stage 1 SACE Credits) and 3 (20 Stage 2 SACE Credits) level.

Over the full day, lessons are structured to meet students' needs with a mixture of knowledge assessments and hands on practical learning. One real aim of the course is to provide students with a simulated workplace experience. Expectations include arrival times being adhered to, the use of PPE (Protective Personal Equipment) when necessary, risk analysis of practical activities and cooperation and respect for fellow workers.

Some of the highlights so far this year have included,

- using basic hand tools to construct and install native Bee hotels and Bird boxes,
- visits to Wittunga Botanical Garden,
- nature walk at the Punchbowl Lookout (Onkaparinga River National Park),
- designing and installing irrigation lines,
- learning names of common native plant species and taking samples and pressing them,
- regular up-keep of the Environmental Learning Centre animals including lizards, stick insects, snakes, fish and turtles.
- collection of native seeds and propagation of plants.

It has been great to work with a group of like-minded students who have a caring and respectful attitude towards nature. Every student believes, what they do makes a difference to the sustainability of the schools natural ecosystem. Plastics have often been a discussion topic. Students are excited that plastic straws are soon to be removed from some supermarket shelves. Another startling statistic discovered recently is that half of all trees originally on the earth have been cut down. Meaning every tree planting in the Environmental Learning Centre grounds really does make a difference.

Term 3 brings optimism as students prepare for a 3 day camp to Morgan. The camp provides students the opportunity to make observations of native wildlife using technologies such as motion sensor camera traps and drone vision.

Another focus of the program is up-cycling materials. Examples are, used timber lengths, bamboo lengths, empty Moccona coffee jars, old hand tools and shade cloth pieces. Christies Beach High School has a proud partnership with Youth Opportunities, a not-for-profit organisation that offers a Personal Leadership Program to our Year 10 students. The course runs for 1 day per week for a term, and is held off school grounds. Students gain skills and strategies in areas including: leadership, achieving goals, career planning, changing habits, increasing motivation, improving communication and relationships, developing confidence and cultivating long-term happiness. Graduates receive 10 SACE points, plus ongoing opportunities and coaching from Youth Opportunities until they finish high school. The program has been running for over 20 years and we have committed to our student's wellbeing and resilience by running 2 programs per year. 
