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# From the Principal

Dear Students, Parents and Caregivers

As we approach the end of Term 1 we can reflect on some really positive stories about activities, events and directions that have begun to influence a renewed culture for Christies Beach High School. I thank each member of our learning community for your contribution to supporting our school and students in ways that celebrate the importance of student wellbeing, safe conditions for learning and a relentless focus on learning achievement for every young person in our care.

A symbol of commitment to school pride by our students has been the overwhelming response to meeting the school uniform requirements. I am reminded of the positive impact this has on our school through frequent comments from members of our community when our students are accessing local events, on school excursions, competing in sporting activities or just walking through the community before and after school. I remind all families that as the cooler months approach there are options for keeping warm within our existing uniform range. Alternative tops, jeans, different colour items in addition to school uniform items are not acceptable.

Our school has been identified as one of four across South Australia to be involved in a Learning Environment Opportunity Study (LEOS). This will result in the development of a facilities masterplan by an architecture company in consultation with our school and Governing Council. This work is the first of its kind and is targeted at giving the school clear direction into the immediate and longer term future about the sorts of learning spaces and whole school design that will meet the needs of this learning community long into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. In conjunction with the new Special Options facility and transformation of the existing technology centre into a world class Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) learning space, the future looks bright for our students.

Throughout this newsletter you will read about the many events that have taken place over Term 1. A highlight has been the high level of community involvement by parents and caregivers, volunteers and community members in a variety of opportunities. Of significant note was the large group in attendance at the first community forum on bullying and violence that led to some immediate responses and ideas for improvements in making our school a safe and violence free place to learn. This work is a priority for us all and will continue relentlessly until we achieve the goal of a violence and bullying free school. Partnerships with local community groups and SA Police demonstrate the commitment to this work right across our community.



# Surfing skills, environmental awareness and personal development

Over two weeks, ten Year 11 students: Troy, Chloe, Zoe, Harrison, Shannon, Tyson, Josh, Phoebe, Emily and Maddie, participated in a community development activity, with a focus on improving knowledge and developing surfing skills at their local beach, Southport.

As residents of Onkaparinga it is important that students connect with their local environment. Surfing is an activity that promotes fitness, personal development, social interaction and a respect for nature.

Over the three days students significantly improved their surfing skills in one foot wave conditions. Many were up and riding waves consistently. Students also demonstrated the ability to perform a conscious surfer rescue. Many discussions occurred about the Southport dune system. Topics included natural movement of sand, human impact, management strategies and dune plants eg spinifex grasses. It was also a chance for students to be independent by preparing their own clothing, food requirements and being sun smart, especially in the hot weather. Teamwork, cooperation and communication were common themes for the three days.

An opportunity will be provided to complete a surfing/environmental workbook, a self-assessment and a 10-minute interview with the teacher. After this reflective component is completed, students have the opportunity to gain 10 SACE credits from their community learning experience.

Thank you to Ms Prior and Ms Jarmyn for supporting the students. It's been awesome to work with such positive, helpful and motivated students and staff.

# St Basil's Homes SA

During Term 1 class SP06 has been going to St Basil's Nursing Home once a week. Every Wednesday we walk from CBHS to the nursing home which is just across the road. There are two areas in St Basil's Homes SA. There is the nursing home area where the residents who need more support live. There is also an independent hostel area which is made up of four hostels. They are called St Matthew's, St Mark's, St Luke's and St John's. The residents that live in the hostels are more independent.

When we arrive at St. Basil's we sign in and then go to two different places where we meet and talk to the elderly people. The recreational room is a common meeting area where the residents from the nursing home and the hostels meet to participate in different activities. We were lucky to be at St. Basil's on International Women's Day, as the staff had organised a quiz about famous women. We were able to join in and help with the answers. It was a lot of fun.

Every week we interact with the residents. Most weeks we see the same residents which is really good as we are getting to know them and feel comfortable with them. The residents talk to us about their lives and their families. We spend time asking them questions and telling them about our lives. Sometimes we sing to them. Most of them say that they like living at the home because they don't have to cook, clean or make their own beds.

One of the women who lives in St Luke's hostel showed us her room. It was very clean and tidy with some of her own furniture in it. She even had a teddy bear sitting on one of the chairs. Another woman from St Luke's showed us her garden which is just outside of her room. We said that we would help her water her garden. She is very happy for us to help her and looks forward to seeing us each week.

We enjoy going to St. Basil's Nursing Home every week. We look forward to spending the morning with the residents who make us feel very welcome. We like the quote that is on one of the walls in the nursing home area of St Basil's. 'Our residents do not live in our workplace ... we work in their home'.

# We Live by the Sea excursion

Students from Stage 1 English classes enjoyed an excursion to the Fringe. The students ventured into the Royal Croquet Club to watch a play entitled 'We Live by the Sea'. Through playful storytelling the audience were introduced to the world of Katy, a 15-year-old girl who has autism. As we entered the venue Katy and her imaginary dog 'Paul Williams' asked to tap each person's shoes. We later found out this is one of the intriguing rituals Katy conducts which allows her to feel safe in a world where she feels she has little control.

The play progressed and the students and staff were on the edge of their seats as they were drawn into the emotional, confronting and humorous world of Katy, and those closest to her.

The performance delved into the themes of friendship, family, autism and kindness. These themes were amplified through the accompaniment of talented live musicians, a simplistic and intimate set and a fantastic light show.

After the production the students were treated to a surprise Q&A session with the cast, musicians, and playwright. The students showed maturity and empathy as they discussed the issues of autism and the difficulty young carers are faced with. The students were also intrigued to discover how the idea for the play was conceived and the creative processes the artists took part in to develop realistic and powerful performances.

Sometimes the best theatre experiences are the ones where you walk away and continue to think about the performance for days to come, where your preconceived thoughts are challenged, you are educated and as a result, you choose to act or change your behaviour. This was definitely one of those performances.

# Bat boxes

During the first few weeks of the year the class made bat boxes so the micro bats in the area could have a safe and secure environment in which to live. There aren't enough trees in the area with hollows to accommodate the bats. Trees take over 100 years to create a small hollow within the tree and the majority of trees in the area aren't old enough, so bats are having to resort to stobie poles which can get too hot in the summer and are inappropriate places for the bats to stay. We used left over wood from old pallets, screws and old tyre tubes. Thanks to Mr Jenkinson and Mr Duke for finding the materials to up-cycle.
