This is an outstanding achievement as the Power Cup is more than 'football'. It uses football as an engagement strategy to engage young Aboriginal students in their education. Achievement of attendance and curriculum targets is a key to participation in the carnival. Over time our Academy has improved in both aspects with the girls team achieving back to back wins.

Also, our SAASTA Academy won 'Best War Cry' and 'Best Motor Accident Commission video'. A fantastic team effort!

Thank you to the Aboriginal Education Team for their high level support of students across the three day carnival.

During the afternoon we will continue our focus on whole school literacy.

## DayMap is changing!!

Many students and their families/caregivers will have noticed that the DayMap layout has recently changed.

Our school has upgraded to Version 9 and we are using this development to improve our service to students and families/caregivers.

During Terms 3 and 4 of this year teachers will be training in placing all learning plans and key assessment tasks into DayMap. Teachers will also be moving to provide informed feedback to students and progressive grades on completed learning tasks to students and families/caregivers through DayMap. As you would appreciate this is a change that requires time for our teachers to prepare for and learn.

To support this improved communication we are staggering the implementation of this change to make certain that we do this well. Our goal is to open the full Parent Portal late this year to allow families to have greatly improved connection to their students learning program.

At the start of 2017 we expect that students and families will be able to access and monitor all learning programs and assessment tasks through DayMap and reporting on progress and assessment will be hosted through this Learner Management System.

## Aboriginal Power Cup Carnival 2016

This was the ninth Power Cup and the most successful so far for our academy, with our girls winning the Grand Final. Reaching the Grand Final is based on points accumulated from curriculum tasks, attendance and performance in the football Carnival. Overall attendance average was 97.1% across the 52 days of Term 1. All curriculum tasks were completed on time and judged externally with two random students selected on the day before the due date by SAASTA head office for grading with each task.

CBHS was one of 40 schools (360 students) competing this year. We won the girls' Grand Final last year and it is the third win by our girls in the nine years of the competition.

We also won the award for the best war cry and the Motor Accident Commission best road safety video. This clip was shown on the big screen during the Power vs West Coast match.

We have an outstanding group of students in the Christies SAASTA Academy with students from Christies Beach High School, Reynella East College, Seaford Secondary College, Seaview High School, Wirreanda Secondary School and Mt Gambier High School.

Behaviour, team spirit and endeavour were all of the highest standard.

At the football Carnival both teams won six games and lost two.

On Wednesday 15 June, Special Options students attended a Space Party at the Adelaide Convention Centre.


Students were able to dress up, eat fabulous food and dance the day away with their peers from other Special Settings across Adelaide.

# Student Subject Selection for 2017 and Course Counselling

In 2016 the school will be continuing with online Subject Selection during the final weeks of Term 2 and in the first weeks of Term 3.

This year we will be changing our web site provider to the Timetable Solutions team who are the managers of our Timetabling software and the new Web Preferences program.

This change enables a more streamlined transfer of information between the subject selection website and our timetabling processes.

Students and families/caregivers will notice some changes to the website layout but pathways and selection steps will generally remain the same.

As in the last three years teachers and leaders will be supporting students through information sessions on subject pathways and practice sessions on the website in the lead up to course counselling days. Course counselling days will be scheduled early in Term 3 [usually Week 3].

Access to the website will be through the school homepage and each student will be given a personalised logon via school email.

Year level subject pathways and descriptors will be accessed through the web preferences link and the school website.

Subject descriptors and pathways can be viewed at any time and selections can be practiced/changed up to a maximum of six times in the lead up to the counselling days in Term 3.

### Reconciliation Week 27 May – 3 June 2016

As part of Reconciliation Week celebrations this year, the students and staff from the Middle School Yarning Groups had the pleasure of attending the *South Australian Reconciliation Launch and Breakfast* at the Adelaide Convention Centre on the morning of Friday, 27 May 2016.

This breakfast marked the beginning of Reconciliation Week and had a strong focus on youth and the national theme of 'Our History, Our Story, Our Future'. There were a number of guest speakers including Marcellus Enallage, the 2016 Office of Youth Channel 9 Young Aboriginal Achiever, Eboni Frankel, the 2016 South Australian Young Citizen of the Year, and Arabella Hart, who received the Governor of South Australia SACE award in 2015 for achieving the best overall performance by an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander student, achieving an ATAR of 99.75.

All the young speakers shared their inspirational stories of hard work, dedication, and the support needed to reach their achievements. We also heard from Tanya Hosch, who is the campaign director of the RECOGNISE Campaign. Tanya spoke of the importance of reconciliation.

The breakfast event was a new and exciting experience for our young Aboriginal students. Around 1,400 guests attended the event from other schools and organisations. It was very rewarding to see how well our students represented themselves and their school in such a great manner; they also looked very smart in their school blazers.

Also as part of Reconciliation Week our girls and boys Yarning Group students hosted assemblies for the whole school along with invited guest including Katrine Hildyard, MP, Mayor Lorraine Rosenberg, Leslie Wilson, State Manager of Aboriginal Education, Alysha Herman, Creative Producer for Express Way Arts, and Gordon Little, Senior Sergeant of the Crime Prevention Unit at Christies Beach. The students talked about the meaning of reconciliation as well as the effects of racism.

They presented a film they had made and shared their thoughts on racism and what we, as a community, could be doing to prevent racism. Talisa and Jasmine were the MCs of the assembly and although they were nervous both girls spoke very well and should be proud of their efforts on the day.

After the assemblies we had a shared BBQ lunch for our special guests, staff and students. They cooked up a storm, serving yummy chicken and native herb burgers with a lemon and herb mayo. The Yarning Groups worked really hard to pull off such a great day, a job well done!

## Care for children is always available

Winter can be a busy time for emergency departments and it is important to consider if it really is an emergency. During the 2015 winter period, South Australian public hospitals saw nearly 1,000 more presentations to emergency departments than the previous winter.

For minor illness or injury, there are a range of other care options to consider, including your local GP or pharmacy. Local health services, including information about after hours services, can be found through the national health services directory at www.nhsd.com.au.

If it is an emergency, emergency care for children is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Some conditions that are not life-threatening for an adult can be more serious for babies and young children. In particular, young babies with fever need to be assessed by a doctor. In an emergency or life threatening situation, always call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.

- Science, Technology and the Community
- · Work and the Community.

This year **Darryl Jones**, an adult student, attended the SACE Merit Ceremony 2016 at Government House. The SACE Merit Ceremony provides the opportunity for the South Australian community to recognise and celebrate the outstanding success of Year 12 students each year. It highlights the diverse range of student learning in the SACE and students' commitment to excellence and achieving their best.

Wellbeing Builder: Anger

Wellbeing Element: Strengths and Emotions

Character Strength: Bravery

Wellbeing Fitness Challenges: Years 7-9 - Move More, Years 10-12 - You Matter

Adolescence is an emotionally challenging period of time for students, parents and teachers.

- · both at home and at school, outbursts of anger and stress attacks can often occur.
- · the teenage brain is anatomically different to our brains; they are not little adults.
- . while their brains are wired up to create emotions like ours, the control centre of their brains, the prefrontal cortex, is not.
- . therefore their emotions often go unchecked and their planning and forward thinking are often quite impulsive.

Combine this with the brain chemicals being released throughout puberty and it is little wonder that the adolescent brain is a turbulent place

- · most cases of adolescent stress and anger are not deliberate, nor defiant
- · a proactive strategy is to initiate discussions about identifying the stressors that trigger emotional behaviours.

The time to repair the roof is when the sun is shining, not when it is raining.

- likewise, the time to have these conversations is when there is calm and no issues occurring, not during emotional episodes
- reading Positive Coping Strategies and Why Self-Calming Strategies? is a proactive exercise
- · a big part of being socially and emotionally resilient is for students to have their own 'off ramps' for anger in place


