Conservation and Land Management (CLM)

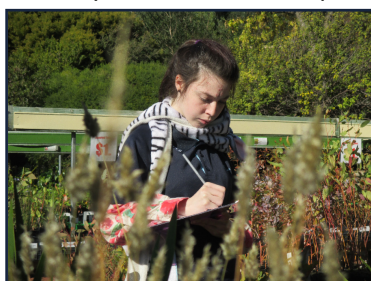

Years 10 & 11 Outdoor Recreation excursion update

During Term 3 the **Year 10 Outdoor Recreation** class visited the Southport sand dunes investigating environmental impacts from storms that frequented the coast.

Observations made included:

- the high prevalence of invasive weeds
- debris carried downstream including logs, prickly pear plants and rubbish
- steep fore dune erosion
- a large build-up of sand at the Onkaparinga River mouth

Afterwards, the group spent one and a half hours walking and making observations of the unique dune system. Talk was "what are we doing to look after this area?"

Upon returning to school discussions occurred about conservation strategies including fencing, dune revegetation and how could the dune system be stabilised?

Everybody enjoyed the opportunity to connect with nature and it provided a positive outlook for the up-coming aquatics sessions.

On the first Wednesday of Term 4 the **Year 11 Outdoor Recreation** class participated in a half day hike (7km) in the local Onkaparinga National Park.

This included the Echidna, Nature and lookout trails.

Students were required to:

- plan an appropriate trail for a three hour adventure
- prepare clothing, drink and food
- navigate trail markers
- use team work to solve problems

After the hike was completed students' comments included "that was a great physical workout" and "I would really like to come back again one day." Thanks to Mr Davies who attended the hiking excursion.

Operation Flinders 2016

During October, ten Year 9 students and two teachers took part in Operation Flinders. Operation Flinders Foundation is a South Australian based charitable organisation that runs a world leading wilderness adventure program for young offenders and young people at risk. The program takes participants between the age of 14 and 18 years on an eight-day exercise in the far northern Flinders Ranges, providing an opportunity for its participants to break away from their past and grow as valued members of the community.

Students (and teachers) were pushed to their physical and mental limits, with every day bringing new challenges. The Christies Beach Operation Flinders team hiked, climbed mountains, crossed rivers, abseiled and engaged in tough team building exercises while carrying a 15kg backpack. The team had minimal creature comforts, with sleeping arrangements involving setting up a hoochie (small tarpaulin tied to a tree) or sleeping under the stars.

Students soon realised that team work was essential. Towards the end of the eight days, the team leader, Greg Stevens, described the Christies Beach team as a 'proper operational Flinders team'. Many students asked if they could stay another eight days. Luckily this did not happen because on the final day a massive storm hit South Australia.

The evening before the storm, the team received instructions to pack up the campsite and hike 5km to the extraction point. The team followed these instructions to the letter, without complaining. This would not have happened on the first few days of the operation. The team departed the Flinders Ranges at 5:00am and made it back to school just before the storm caused widespread damage, flooding and a massive power blackout.

The students would like to thank the bus drivers who took them to and from Operation Flinders.

The students who took part in Operation Flinders should be congratulated on their grit, perseverance and team work.

Progress on our STEM Works upgrade is gathering pace, following the appointment of Flightpath Architects as the project's architect. STEM is the name given to science, technology, engineering and mathematics (incorporating physics and chemistry). These are often taught together, recognising their interrelationship.

Over the next few weeks, the architects will work closely with school and department staff to develop project plans. Bullying

At Christies Beach High School we are committed to creating a safe, supportive school environment, free from bullying, harassment and violence.

Our message to students is that there is no place for bullying at school or anywhere else. Bullying, in any shape or form, is not tolerated. Bullying can include cyber bullying, physical violence, intimidation or humiliation.

We know that bullying can have a significant impact on learning and relationships if not dealt with effectively. We make an effort to discuss these matters with the students to ensure that they understand what bullying is, how to avoid being a bully, and how to respond to it. We encourage students to seek support from staff, or another trusted adult, if they feel they are being bullied. Within our school, we strive to address any bullying behaviour promptly, through educating students about their behaviour and using restorative processes to rebuild relationships. Students are supported to recover from bullying so they can continue to build effective relationships and be successful in their learning.

Online bullying is a growing concern, and very difficult to monitor. There are, however, a number of things that you can do if you are feeling bullied online. If you feel that you are being bullied online, you can

- block other users
- report posts to social media providers eg Facebook
- report it to the local Police
- report cyberbullying at www.acorn.gov.au

ACORN is a federal government initiative by the Children's e-safety Commissioner. It has useful information about cyberbullying, possible resolutions and reporting. Reporting can be done anonymously, and is taken very seriously.

Skin cancer

Australia has the highest incidence of skin cancer in the world. Two in three Australians will get skin cancer before the age of 70 and over 2,000 Australians die from skin cancer each year.

The SunSmart UV Alert is a tool that indicates the hours when sun protection is needed on any given day (eg 8:15am to 4:20pm). The SunSmart UV Alert times are issued daily by the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) when the UV Index is forecast to reach 3 or above. When a SunSmart UV Alert is issued sun protection measures are recommended during the times indicated.

Please be aware of the UV index on any given day and apply the steps listed to reduce your risk of skin damage.

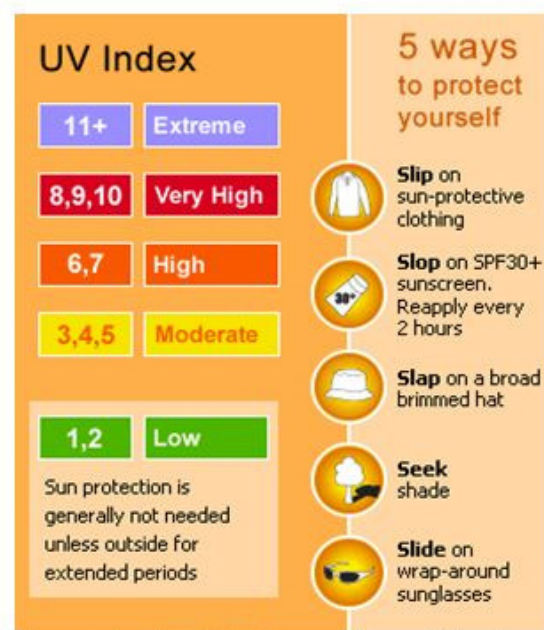

We're excited to announce that the Christies Beach Special Options students will be taking part in Kay-A-Day this term. Kay-A-Day is a Jodi Lee Foundation initiative, designed to encourage kids to run just one kilometre a day for 21 days – the distance of a half marathon!

Students had a visit from Kay-A-Day ambassador, Port Adelaide Football Club defender Tom Jonas, earlier in the term.

In Australia 9 out of 10 young people don't get enough exercise each day, which isn't great because physical activity is really important for overall health, and reduces the risk of developing certain diseases later in life – including bowel cancer.

Kay-A-Day gives kids an easy way to start improving their general fitness. Friends and family can get involved too by sponsoring for every 'kay' completed.

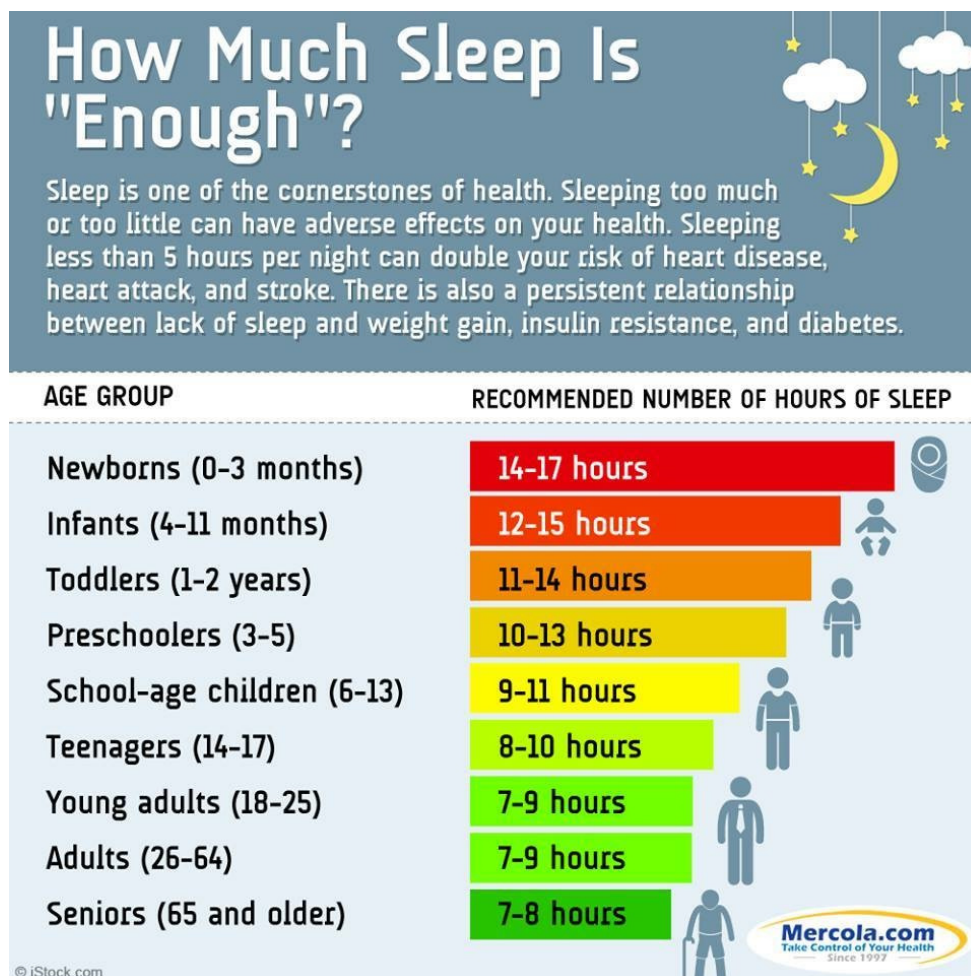
Career Services

Eligibility for Career Services for South Australian residents who:

- do not have a job and want to work (don't have to be registered with Centrelink)
- are underemployed (working less than 30 hours on average per week, are wanting to and able to work more hours)
- face retrenchment or are made redundant
- over 17 years of age and not in fulltime education ie University, TAFE SA
- are a stream A job active client (job active providers could make a payment for B & C clients or justify in writing why they can't contribute)
- Disability Employment Service clients are serviced on a case by case basis and on the provision that the service they will receive from Career Services is not duplicating the service that the DES provider is expected to provide to their client
