## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

To parents, caregivers, students and community,

#### PRINCIPAL APPOINTMENT

It is with immense pride and humility that I recently accepted the opportunity to lead our school as principal for the next six or so years. Over the last eight months I have developed a deep connection with the school community and most importantly the children we work with every day. The school is well placed to continue an exciting improvement journey with many exciting projects and opportunities on the horizon. A focus of mine is

to bring parents, caregivers, volunteers and community people closer to the everyday operations of our school, as together we can make the future for our children a bright one. I look forward to our work together as we make Christies Beach High School a place all the families in our community trust for quality education and wellbeing support for their children.

#### **BUILDING PROJECTS**

In the coming weeks and months you will see a lot of activity around the school as a couple of significant building projects commence. The first is the new 'Disability Unit' – a facility designed and built specifically to meet the needs of our students with identified learning needs beyond those traditional school structures provide. The project will commence around 10 July and take almost a year to complete. We look forward to watching the progress and eventually opening the facility about this time next year. A couple of images are provided here to give an idea of what the finished building will look like.



Soon after commencement a second major project will start – the renovation of the existing technology studies centre into an innovative learning space that provides for exciting learning within the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). This \$2.5 million project will be completed during 2018 and reflects some of the most outstanding learning space design currently seen across the education community.

Early in Term 3 you will be invited to participate in a community forum where we seek your ideas about long term plans for the school's learning environments. We are well placed to make some other major improvements, and it's important we get it right, hence the ideas and wishes of the community are critical parts of the design process.

The Student Free Day on Monday 24 July will see all staff at Christies Beach High School continue their professional development. This comes in line with Graham Clark being announced as our Principal for the next six years.

## **CURRICULUM REVIEW**

Over the past few months a large team of staff have been involved in a review of the school's curriculum, timetable and daily structures. This work has been done with the clear goal of ensuring our school has a curriculum design and timetable structure that meets the needs of our diverse student group. We believe that a number of factors being considered will benefit our students, including:

- Moving the start time from 8.30am to 9.00am
- Three learning blocks of 105 minutes each day, with each day the same length, removing the early finish on Monday
- Starting the day with a teaching block rather than Care Group
- Adopting a middle schooling model where students and teachers work in learning teams, have fewer different teachers and less movement throughout the day
- Increasing contact time per subject at Year 12 with less free time
- Having all students engaged in a comprehensive wellbeing program for 35 minutes each day
- Increasing the amount of subject choice gradually from Year 9 to 12 to allow personal pathways to develop.

The review has reached a point where we would like to share the details with families and community and seek your feedback. To enable this a Curriculum and Learning Forum has been scheduled for early in Term 3. At this event you'll have a chance to hear more detail, ask questions and provide your ideas. Details are:

# **SCIENCE NEWS**

It has been a busy term for the Science team. Students have engaged with numerous activities in their classes as well as activities outside of the classroom.

Year 9 students had a visit to the SA Power museum as part of their unit looking at energy.

A select group of Year 10 students took part in the Women in Technology day at the University of Adelaide. This fantastic day, put on by the engineering department, gave students a taste of university life. Students participated in various activities as tasters to possible careers in the area of engineering. Some of the great activities were a Virtual Reality tour of the earth's crust, developing a solution to make safe drinking water and building a tower out of Lego. All students agreed they enjoyed the day after initially feeling cautious about being at the university. An aim of our school is to give all students these experiences so they see a pathway to university as something they can achieve and we plan to return again.

The Year 11 Biology students, as part of their look at the human body and diseases, visited the Flinders Medical Centre Anatomy Museum. This was a unique opportunity for high school students to see what medical students at Flinders get to experience as part of their studies. A highlight of the excursion was to take a 3D tour through a digitised human body.

# **WORK EXPERIENCE/WORKPLACE LEARNING**

On Thursday 8 June 2017 all Year 10 students completed a Workplace Learning Program organised by Ms Henry. The students went through six different topics each, receiving a certificate after completion. This was a compulsory task before any student could commence work experience through the school. The following is a brief outline of the topics covered.

### **HUNT FOR HAZARDS**

An online game where there were hazards and solutions. The students had to drag the right solution to each hazard.

#### VIRTUAL WORKPLACE HAZARDS

Another game online where students had to look at the hazards, with suggestions on how to fix them. Students had to choose the one they thought would be the safest way to fix it.

#### **SAFETY CHECK**

Students had to read each page and at the bottom of each page was a sentence on different situations that they had to logically complete.

#### **ACTU BULLYING QUIZ**

This was a quiz that would come up with questions and answers. Students had to tick each answer that would apply to them.

#### **EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR SCHOOLS**

With this topic students had to read about Human Rights, Equal Opportunities and different types of discrimination. Students read about what they can do and where they can go to if they think they're not being treated fairly or discriminated against, etc.

#### **CHILD PROTECTION**

Demonstrated situations where children in the workplace were asked to work unreasonable hours at their job for their age and how to handle it.

The day was for all Year 10 students to have a glimpse into the work force. They are now ready to work in a safe environment. Through Christies Beach High School they are now able to gain work experience or look for a part-time job.

# **CONSERVATION AND LAND MANAGEMENT (CLM) NEWS**

On Wednesday 7 June, Animals Anonymous presented their 'Conservation Through Education' animal show to the students studying Conservation and Land Management.

The students often focus on 'sustainable environmental work practices' which aims to create natural habitats for local native animals. An example of this is designing and making bird boxes.

The hour-long animal show provided students with hands on experience and interaction with a number of native animals. They were able to make the connection of why we need to care for the natural world and possible future work options.

The animals included a Woma Python, Heath Monitor Lizard, Bettong, baby Fresh Water Crocodile, Tawny Frogmouth and Carpet Python.

Adrian from 'Animals Anonymous' was an excellent presenter. He provided knowledge of each animal's habitat, living conditions and provided every student an opportunity to feel the fur, feathers or skin of each animal, except the baby crocodile, of course, with their razor sharp teeth.

Adrian answered many questions and was vocal about students finding their 'passion in the world' and gaining as many 'industry skills' as they could before leaving school. This could incorporate volunteering, VET courses or even personal projects.



# NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA ON SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY

Christies Beach High School have commenced the annual Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) which counts the number of our students receiving an adjustment due to disability and the level of reasonable adjustment they are receiving.

This information will help teachers, principals, education authorities and families to better support students with disability to take part in school on the same basis as other students.

The national data collection provides an opportunity for schools to review their learning and support systems and processes to continually improve education outcomes for their students with disability.

This will involve the collection of the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students, the level of adjustment provided to students, and where known, the student's type of disability.

Under the collection model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions.

If your child is identified for inclusion in the collection, the required information about your child will be included in this year's data collection.
