Ngarrindjeri is a language group that is located South of Adelaide. Ngarrindjeri was chosen as the name for the blue team because Ngarrindjeri land borders along the Murray River, Fleurieu Peninsula and the Coorong. The pelican was chosen as the team's mascot as it is a prominent bird known to this area.

Kaurna is the land that we stand on here at Christies Beach High School and the Adelaide Plains region. It is the language group of the local people to this area. Kaurna was chosen as the name for the green team as the area is known for its luscious green plains. The Kari (emu) is significant to a dreamtime story of the Kaurna people.

Narungga is a language group that is on the Yorke Peninsula that spreads as far North as Port Broughton. Narungga was chosen for the yellow team as it encompasses both coastal and inland areas. The sleepy lizard was chosen as the mascot as it features in multiple dreamtime stories of the Narungga people.

2019 SCHOOL LEAVER STUDY

All year 13 students who were enrolled in year 12 in South Australia in 2018 are invited to have a throat swab taken as part of the B Part of It study to measure meningococcal bacteria carriage.

You do not need to have participated in the High School Study in 2017 or 2018 to participate in this third component of the study.

Any year 13 students who would like to participate and have a throat swab taken will be required to complete a brief questionnaire and a consent form. Students will be reimbursed for their time with a \$40.00 Coles-Myer voucher. No vaccines will be administered. A scheduled time will be available to have the swab taken at school.

MIDDLE SCHOOL SUSTAINABILITY AWARENESS ACTIVITIES

During term 4, every student in Christies Beach High School's Middle School has participated in a Sustainability Awareness Program, based in the Environmental Learning Centre.

The program was developed by Michael Jenkinson, Conservation and Land Management Teacher, in collaboration with Michael Duke's Environmental Science class. The overall concept was to promote "sustainability" whilst providing the opportunity for students in year 10s and 11 to develop personal confidence by facilitating learning activities for middle school students.

What does sustainability mean to us at Christies Beach High School? "It means making smart choices about how we use things such as energy and water and how much waste we produce". The activities students engaged with included:

- mixing a range of measured materials including sand, soil, water and clay powder to slowly compact in wooden formwork to make a "Rammed Earth" brick
- selecting, arranging and then constructing a "Native Bee" hotel using recycled timber and basic hand tools
- using an aerial map constructed using drone photos to develop navigation skills whilst completing a garden quiz focusing on native plants.

At the end of the activity session students came together in the Environmental Learning lab to debrief the sessions. Discussion generally focused on what each student could do as an individual in their life to reduce their impact on the natural environment. Examples included not using cling wrap, using recycling bins more effectively and being water wise. Each student received a Laser engraved keyring (designed and produced in the STEM building) to keep, reminding students that the issue of "sustainability" in society is real, and every little thing they do counts towards future generations accessing the same environment that we have.
