# 2021 SCHOOL CARD

## **SCHOOL CARD SCHEME**

The School Card scheme offers financial assistance with school fees (materials and services charges) for students attending government schools each year.

### School Card must be applied for each year.

Applications for the 2021 School Card scheme are open and can be completed online.

School Card information and application forms can be found using the following link: www.sa.gov.au/education/schoolcard

### **ELIGIBILITY**

School Card is available to:

- Families with children aged four years and over who attend school full time
- Independent full-time students studying Year 10, 11 or 12
- Adult re-entry students undertaking subjects to complete their SACE.

Eligibility is not dependent on any family member receiving any Centrelink benefits or Family Tax Benefits.

# **INCOME LIMITS**

The tables below list the income limits for applications lodged in 2021 – based on the family's gross income in 2019/2020.

To qualify for School Card, your family's gross income must be below a certain limit. This limit depends on how many dependent children you have. You will need to provide proof of income – such as payslips or Centrelink information.

# SAASTA

The South Australia Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy (SAASTA) had a very busy start to 2021.

Students are chosen based on high attendance, positive behaviours and achievement. In 2021, Stage 2 students have been enrolled in a Health and Wellbeing course, while Stage 1 students have been completing Aboriginal Studies.

In week 3, Year 12 students attended an Induction Day where they participated in 4 workshops, all with Aboriginal health professionals, which has set them up with key learning and contacts for the year. This has given them a great early momentum with further school visits already underway.

Week 6 saw our first follow-up visit from this day, with Malcolm Aston from the Aboriginal Health Council SA (ACHSA) delivering a workshop to our whole class on the risks of drug and alcohol use. Malcom was very informative, and students gained valuable knowledge from his interactive activities of some of these dangers in the community.

In week 8 we had Aboriginal artist, Micky Barlow visit the classroom to deliver an arts workshop to support the Stage 1 students in creating their own individual art pieces.

Micky bought in some of her own art work to show students, shared her experiences of using art as a means of storytelling and told how stories passed down from generation to generation is a valuable way of keeping these stories known.

Micky has an inspiring contemporary art gallery in McLaren Vale that is well worth a visit if you are in the area.

During week 8, Stage 2 students also hosted a SAASTA community morning tea to acknowledge Close the Gap Day. This is a government initiative aimed at closing the health, child education and life expectancy gaps between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians.

Many local health organisations came to the event, interacted with staff and students and shared with us how their organisations support the Southern Aboriginal community.

Our Year 12s did an amazing job hosting the event and should be extremely proud of their efforts.

While it's been a busy start to the year for SAASTA, it has also been fantastic to allow the community back into the school which had been hard to do during 2020.

This is open for all students from Years 8-12. Rehearsals run during lunchtime in the Performing Arts Centre (PAC) on Wednesdays and Fridays.



# ARTIST MANDI GLYNN-JONES VISITS YEAR 11 VISUAL ARTS STUDENTS

On Friday 19 March we had the pleasure of hearing about the life journey of Mandi Glynn-Jones, a Welsh-Australian artist, known for her striking fabric designs and creative portrait drawings.

Mandi brought a portfolio of images to show the students a representation of her work and its progression over the decades until the present.

She spoke to the students about challenges she faced in supporting her family as an artist, designing for ACTIL and other bedding companies and how she worked in a school as a librarian and utilising her art to support student activities by taking school groups and also hosting local council workshops.

Mandi also demonstrated some of her techniques for designing colourful patterns using copic

and prisma markers and black micron pens. She shared her

designs with students as examples for them to source ideas for their own artworks.

Students engaged well throughout the session and practised colourful pattern-work of their own to contribute to their folio study of an Artist.

Recently Mandi has been involved

in mural making at Port Adelaide's

"Wonderwalls Outdoor Gallery 2020". She has also been drawing portraits of people, dogs and Australian animals, in her vibrant patterned and colourful way, and selling her work at the Sydney Markets, where she was invited to design the merchandise for the new Sydney Zoo. She also sells her work online.

The Smith Family Learning for Life education scholarships give families and students the opportunity to access everyday needs for education by reducing financial difficulty and supporting the whole family to achieve.


# Who is eligible for a Scholarship?

1. Parents who have a child/children who attend the following schools:

Coorara Primary School Flaxmill Primary School Morphett Vale East Primary School Morphett Vale Primary School Pimpala Primary School Reynella East College Reynella South School Wirreanda Secondary School Christies Beach Primary School Christies Beach High School Christie Downs Primary School Lonsdale Heights Primary School O'Sullivan Beach Primary School Port Noarlunga Primary School Hackham East Primary School Hackham West Primary School **Huntfield Heights Primary School** Noarlunga Downs Primary School Seaford K-7School Seaford Secondary College

- 2. Parents who have a current pension concession or health care card
- Parents who demonstrate a strong commitment to education through 90% school attendance.

Families who meet these three criteria can receive payments from \$450 per year, per student to help with the costs of their child's education expenses such as uniforms, book, subject fees, excursions & camps etc.
