FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear parents, caregivers, students and the community,

We continue to learn how to improve and our staff are reflecting deeply on how we can be even better prepared for the future if school has to close for any reasons.

NAPLAN

During the month of May our year 9 students undertook NAPLAN testing. We are pleased to report that close to 90% of our students sat these tests. This is important to us as it gives a more complete data set, enabling better alignment of resources to students requiring interventions across numeracy, reading, writing and language.

In 2022 we welcome year 7 students to CBHS for the first time and many have joined in on our tours, as well as year 8 students starting with us next year.

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PARLIAMENT HOUSE DINNER

Every single one of them spoke about their desire to make sure the voice of other students was heard... and that other students knew that there were people who cared about them... and help them raise issues that were important to them'. SCHOOL SPORTS

Earlier in the year one of our teachers took on the role of Sports Organiser. This role is a fantastic addition to our school sports programs for students. BUILDING OPENINGS

On Monday 21 June we had the pleasure of welcoming the Honorable David Pisoni MP, Minister for Innovation and Skills and other parliamentary and Department for Education dignitaries to our school. Three previously completed building projects – Inclusive Education Centre, STEM Centre and Middle School buildings were officially opened as part of a whole school assembly, albeit delayed due to recent COVID disruptions. Six of our Student Voice representatives spoke to the audience about the impact our new state-of-the-art facilities have made to their experience and learning and once again our students did us extremely proud. YEAR 9 GEOGRAPHY EXCURSION

In week 7, the year 9 cohort went on an excursion to the Christies Beach Esplanade to determine the impact of tourism on the local area.

Students performed geographical fieldwork skills such as sketching, counting facilities and attractions to collect data, completing bipolar analyses, and interviewing key stakeholders.

The results of these skills allowed students to determine the social, economic, and environmental impacts of tourism.

Upon returning to school, students annotated maps to record the locations of their observations and key tourism hotspots. The final aspect of the task was to make judgements about the future of tourism in Christies Beach, and to make recommendations about what their judgements would mean for the local community.

Overall it was a fantastic opportunity for students to engage in learning outside of the classroom to learn more about the local community.

This event tied into several tasks that the students have worked on this term and will be continuing next term.


Year 8 students have been studying measurement in mathematics, working on a cross-curricular assignment with science. They have learnt about perimeter, area and volume and designed a footprint map of the zoo. They are currently designing a three-dimensional figure of a chosen animal from their Zoo visit. Next term students will be comparing digestive and respiratory systems between humans and other animals.

Although on the return journey the rain caught us out the students all seemed to enjoy the day and have used their experience to advance their learning.

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FLO STUDENTS IN SACE, VET, TRAINING, APPRENTICESHIPS AND WORK

- Having applied through Renewal SA against a number of applicants across our state, one of our current students was recently chosen for work experience at Commercial Real Estate.
- FLO currently has several high achieving students managing the demands of employment as well as schooling. Some are studying towards a vocational education at Certificate III level at TAFE and MADEC.
- One of our students recently completed a Certificate III in Individual Support and found employment and another of our SACE 2019 completers is now studying Certificate IV in Disability Services.
- Several our students have been successful in securing traineeships and apprenticeships. A current student has started an apprenticeship with Bakers Delight. Three past students from the Young Mum's Program have also gained employment. One gained employment as an ASETO at a local primary school. Both of the other students now have traineeships. One is with Noarlunga Aboriginal Health and the other with Legal SA Services.
- Another of our student successes who in term 1 gained employment through a Traineeship at Flinders University, is Tahlarah Jackson-Taylor.

Tahlarah's comprehensive resume and successful interview with the ALF Sports at Flinders University has led to her starting a Certificate III in Laboratory Skills. This will assist Tahlarah to complete her SACE at the end of the 2021. Tahlarah has been an active part of FLO and we wish her the very best in her future endeavours.

Speaking with Dr Moffat afterward he conveyed his joy with the way the students behaved and expressed an eagerness to come back next year when we teach the unit again. This was a valuable learning experience for the year 9 students and an exemplary demonstration of Christies Beach High School.

In week 5 the 2021 Christies Beach Academy SAASTA class, which is made up of students from Christies Beach High School and surrounding schools, participated in the SANTOS Aboriginal Power Cup.

This event is supported by the Port Adelaide Football Club, South Australian Government and SAASTA with over 500 students enrolled from across the state.

To be invited to participate in the SAPC students had to complete all given tasks, have a high attendance rate and demonstrate positive behaviour at all times. Over two days, students participated in a football carnival, a careers expo, filmed a road safety advertisement and practiced their cultural dance.

On the last day, the students had a sit-down luncheon and performed their dance at Adelaide Oval before watching the AFL Port Adelaide vs Fremantle game.

The teams had varying degrees of success throughout the football carnival. The boys' team had a slow start on Day 1, with plenty of highs and lows sprinkled throughout the day. They hit their straps on Day 2, winning each of their three games.

The Christies Beach Academy boys' team came in third overall, just missing the chance to play in the SAPC Grand Final on Adelaide Oval.

The girls' team also had varying degrees of success, winning some games and being extremely competitive in others. Our team joined with Mark Oliphant College and it was great to see these girls have a friendly scratch match against each other to finish off the carnival.

Due to player shortage in one of the Grand Final teams, two of our players were able to fill in and experience the thrill of playing on Adelaide Oval in front of a crowd of thousands.

The Grand Final teams are decided not only on their football results, but a combination of work completion, attendance percentage, positive behaviours and participation in the careers expo, road safety advertisement and cultural dance practice, which shows a great determination to succeed.

The Aboriginal Power Cup is a great culmination of the first semester of SAASTA, especially as it falls in the AFL Sir Doug Nicholls Round.

The overall experience was a great success and the students are looking forward to next year with enthusiasm.

SPORTS COACHING

In week 6 our year 10 Community Connections Sports Coaching class embarked on an excursion to Christies Beach Primary School to deliver a coaching session to their year 4 students.

Our students spent considerable time and effort beforehand, with much planning and practice, to ensure the event ran smoothly.

The primary school year 4 classes greeted us after lunch and they were then placed into four groups.

Our students then presented their coaching sessions with great confidence and fun with an underlying focus of skill development and participation.

Here are some of our student's views of the day:

Last Wednesday Olivia and I demonstrated soccer skills to a group of 10-year-olds and asked them to follow and learn from us. The first drill we completed was shooting for goals, then we expanded on that by asking them to verse their partner. Once the drills were over, we asked them to play a simple game of soccer without any fixed positions - the focus was on passing to each other and shooting goals.

We learnt how to speak to children in a way that they could easily comprehend making sure we spoke slowly and clearly in simple terms that efficiently described what we needed them to do.

We decided to do basketball for our group. The drills we did were dribbling the ball around the cones and shooting goals. Our favourite part of the afternoon was when we decided to play the basketball game.

We learnt that it takes a lot of encouragement for students to join and that once they are encouraged to, they don't want to stop.

Our game was called Kick and Run, which is a combination of soccer and baseball. The drill and skill game we did was Red Rover All Over, along with a passing drill. This included a challenge to see which group could connect the most successful passes in a row.

Our favourite part of the afternoon was watching the students enjoy themselves while playing our game and cheering their teammates. We both learnt that to coach young children you must be patient and explain instructions clearly, and encourage and make things fun for them to enjoy.

We both learnt that to coach young children you must be patient and explain instructions clearly, and encourage and make things fun for them to enjoy.

The day was deemed a great success as a result of the Sharks determination and team effort and all players came off the ice with their heads held high.



IEC 7 DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

This semester the students from IEC 7 have been using the STEM space to undertake various Design and Technology projects.

The "IEC 7 Tech Crew" produced 3D CAD modelling projects, small video game coding tasks, virtual world design tasks and traditional woodworking projects.

Using digital technologies, students began the semester by digitally designing and modelling their own toy characters using specific Computer Aided Design software. They further developed their designing and digital technology skills by producing a virtual house and garden using the sandbox app, Minecraft. Students then linked their virtual world to the sustainable practices that they use in their own homes or here at Christies Beach High School. Using the coding app Scratch students designed their own maze game, using various keyboard inputs to control their character to the end of the game.

In the wood workshop, students have been using woodworking hand tools, power tools and fixed machinery to create various projects. Students used their 3D modelled character as a guide to create their own small wooden toy. They then measured their electronic devices and used these measurements to individually create their own passive acoustic speaker. To finish the term, students used their design thinking skills to create artistic chopping boards that were engraved using the advanced manufacturing technologies available in the STEM space.

The IEC 7 Tech Crew students have provided some fantastic results with new items being created and many new skills being learnt, but most importantly numerous laughs and smiles were had all round. They should all be proud of their excellent efforts!



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
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
